


We asked Nicola if she would send a message about reading for pleasure to our pupils, and this is what she kindly wrote...

We turned our thoughts into words, bringing them together to create a 'wilderness monster' display (with the help of Miss Walker!)




We then created class poems.


'You're a Poet' (by Sean Taylor and Sam Usher) helped us to structure the poems.

The children were thrilled to receive kind 'thank you' letters from many members of our local community!








The UKLA award panel were so impressed with the children's project that they sent us a big box of brilliant books for our library!






The whole school have taken part in the SPARK! book awards. We have loved reading the books and watching the online author visits.








Congratulations to Daniel in Class 9 who was our school winner! He created an amazing animation based on 'Who Ate Steve?' He used ScratchJr to create his animation.






# Do we judge a book by its cover?

by Hiba Noor Khan (For ages 9+)

Three best friends are born on the same day under miraculous circumstances. But by their twelfth birthday, Jahan, Ravi and Lakshmi's lives are about to change forever. The British announce Indian independence and draw lines of Partition that tear apart the country, and the friends. One of them flees, one of them disappears, and the other is left wondering, could a miracle bring them back together? This is a must read!!



#### The Ministry of Time

by Kaliane Bradley (Adult Fiction)

A civil servant is offered a lucrative job in a mysterious new government ministry gathering 'expats' from across history to test whether time-travel is feasible. Her role is to work as a 'bridge': living with, supporting and monitoring expat '1847' - Commander Graham Gore, a former Victorian polar explorer. As the true shape of the project that brought them together begins to emerge, Gore and the bridge are forced to confront their past choices and imagined futures.

# Why is Reading for Pleasure important?


Children who read for pleasure have a wider vocabulary and general knowledge, an enriched imagination and more developed narrative writing (Senechal et al., 2018). Reading for Pleasure is more important than either wealth or social class as an indicator of success at school. It can increase empathy, improve relationships with others and improve wellbeing throughout life (The Reading Agency 2015).








# **Picturebook Recommendations**




### Don't Trust Fish by Neil Sharston and Dan Santat


# Gina Kaminski Rescues the Giant by Craig Barr-Green & Francis Martin


#### Grandpa Kuma by Michelle Maiden

Grandpa Kuma has travelled from Japan to America to meet his granddaughter and everyone is excited about the visit. Kuma has plenty to say...but no one understands him. So is it possible to get along and have fun before he has to fly home? A delightful look at the barriers language can create and the ways in which love and play can overcome. A dual language title. #### The Bear-Shaped Hole by John and Thomas Docherty


Gerda and Orlo are best bear friends. When Gerda was there, Orlo always had time for a game or a story, a joke or a rhyme. He was never too busy to listen, to talk, to help, to share, or to go for a walk. But Orlo reveals he is ill, and as he softly explains to Gerda, he is not going to get better. Gerda is overwhelmed by emotions she cannot quite explain, but Orlo gently helps her prepare, so they can spend their time together making memories that will last a lifetime. When the time comes, Gerda can fill the Bear-Shaped hole in her life with the special moments she shared with Orlo (F2-Y2)



#### 100 Goats and Granny! by Atinuke



#### Robin Hood by Bethan Woollvin

In the heart of the woods by the oldest oak tree, you might find a fierce little girl. Her name is Robin Hood, and she is about to go on a rollicking adventure full of mischief and mayhem. The Sheriff is taking something from everybody — from the farms, the village and the forest itself! Can Robin protect her people from the thieving Sheriff? Bethan Woollvin reimagines the traditional English folktale, this time with a little girl at the helm of the story. Publishing on June 26th. (F2-Y2)



#### Bear by Natalia Shaloshvili

This is a whimsical and laugh-out-loud funny picture book about how hard it can be to say what you really mean – and why it's best to avoid bottling up emotions, so they don't come bursting out in one big AAAAAARGH. Bear is all set for a perfect day. But no sooner has Bear made himself comfortable, than along comes Fox who wants to share his bench. Bear agrees, begrudgingly. But no sooner has he overcome the idea of sharing his bench when Wolf pops up to ask for a bit of cookie. And before Bear knows it, it's all become too much for him! AAAAAARGH! yells Bear. 
#### Wild by Katya Balen




# **Poetry Recommendations**




Big Red Dinosaur by Jane Newbury




Mushrooms Know by Kallie George & Sara Gillinham




#### Slug Life by Moesha Kellaway



and the Museum of Zoology, University of Cambridge (Y2+)




My First Ocean Atlas by Catherine Ard & Paul Davis

### Family by Patricia Hegarty & Britta Teckentrup






Hello World: A Celebration of Languages and Curiosities by Jonathan Litton & L'Atelier Cartographic




#### Barnacle Bay by Sheena Jana Curll




### Unicorn Boy by Dave Roman




#### The Guinea-Pig Party by Holly Web



Suddenly her eyes are opened to a whole new world – and magical woodland creatures show Shyla how to spread the word about protecting the forest. (7+)




#### Hotel for Cats by Marie Pavlenko & Marie Voyelle

At a hotel in Paris four cats are in charge. There's bossy Bobine, a secret knitter; tough-talking Mulot; wannabe singing superstar Carpette; and Couscousse, who's friends with a ghost. 




