Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make good progress and achieve high attainment across all subject areas. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including progress for those who are already high attainers.

We will consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who have a social worker and young carers. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Our strategy is also integral to wider school plans for education recovery, notably in its targeted support through the National Tutoring Programme for pupils whose education has been worst affected, including non-disadvantaged pupils.

Our approach will be responsive to common challenges and individual needs, and will be based upon detailed pupil progress and diagnostic assessment. The approaches we have adopted complement each other to help pupils fulfil their potential. To ensure they are effective we will:

- ensure disadvantaged pupils are challenged in the work that they're set
- act early to intervene at the point need is identified
- adopt a whole school approach in which all staff take responsibility for disadvantaged pupils' outcomes and raise expectations of what they can achieve

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

1	Below average skills within English (with particular focus around writing and phonics), potentially exacerbated from Covid19 disruption.

2	Below average skills within Mathematics, with assessment processes indicating disproportionate impact upon disadvantaged pupils' learning in the context of Covid19 disruption.
3	Low self-confidence within learning engagement, with particular respect to engagement in the context of home learning
4	Reduced ability to maintain good attendance and punctuality
5	Reduced opportunity to access extra-curricular and out-of-school activities

Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

- Within EYFS scrutiny of learning by teaching staff indicates that disadvantaged pupils made good progress from their starting points as indicated through baseline attainment, but that basic skills (particularly within Writing) will form a continuing priority for this pupil grouping in terms of catch-up provision in 2022/23
- Within KS1, analysis indicates a strong impact in diminishing difference from the school's Pupil Premium Strategy for children in Y2. PP children have attained more highly in the combined indicator (Reading, Writing & Maths) than All pupils in Y2 by +6%, indicating a highly positive level of attainment.
- This combined indicator in Y1 is -5%. Closer analysis shows that this represents 3 pupils who did not attain ARE, all of whom did not attend school during Covid lock-down periods, indicating that this continues to have an impact on their learning. Further focus is therefore embedded in the school's PP Strategy Statement in these areas in order to identify gaps in learning which may be impacting upon the progress of these pupils in 2022/23.
- Analysis at KS1 of narrowing of gaps in progress indicates a similar pattern to attainment with Y1 pupils making slightly lower progress to all pupils from their starting points at the beginning of the year (-7% combined in comparison to all pupils), and Y2 making accelerated progress (+6% in comparison to all pupils).
